Local provenance native tubestock planted within the golf precinct



Tubestock planted includes 200 locally rare Melaleuca halmaturorum. as well as 100 Adriana quadripartita and 780 Poa poaformis to further butterfly habitat for the rare Bitterbush Blue and **Cynone Grass Skipper** butterflies that are known to occur or have previously occurred in the grea at the golf precinct



of mulch has been spread on the planting area to supress weeds, improve soil and help protect plantings at the golf precinct



Local provenance native plant species which occur or would have previously occurred at the golf precinct have been reintroduced

> Area Planted approximately at the golf precinct



Targeted eradication of non-native invasive and introduced weed species - 43 species identified and control undertaken including removal of 6 declared weed species

24 colonisina native plant species identified prior to revegetation works commencing



Creekline and Riparian restoration carried out along approximately 350m of watercourse

> A further 725m (approximately) of creekline restoration is planned in the coming years

14 native bird species observed during an initial baseline survey, including the less common Striated Pardalote, Red-browed Finch, Black Shouldered Kite and the Little Grassbird
